Pedagogy for the People: The Impact of TA-centered Equity and Inclusion Training on Student Learning Outcomes

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In the Fall of 2016, I joined the coordinators of Introductory Biology 151/152 at the University of Wisconsin –Madison as an Educational Specialist. My primary focus was the implementation of TA-centered equity and inclusion training for the purpose of better equipping TAs to respond to students' need for an inclusive learning environment (i.e., in-depth understanding of racial, ethnic, gender, socioeconomic differences) and adopt empathic pedagogical practices (e.g., facilitating in-class activities designed to engage multiple learning modalities, using gender-inclusive language, etc.). In this mini workshop, we will explore the TAs' concerns (e.g., How should TAs address the post-election fears of minoritized students?); I will detail the components of these trainings, (e.g., brave space/courageous conversations, Theatre of the Oppressed methodology); and we will discuss the impacts of TA trainings on the TAs themselves, as well as on the students enrolled in the course.
